Eight Outstanding Community Pubs

Nik Antona, CAMRA's National Chairman said: 'Pubs play a significant role in communities across the country, providing a space for local people to meet, helping to tackle loneliness, and having a positive impact on the personal wellbeing of pub-goers.'

Thatcham pubs rarely win CAMRA awards but the efforts of Lisa and Louis Ludewig generated nominations that led to the West Berkshire CAMRA 2019 Community Pub of the Year award for the Kings Head, Thatcham.

Since arriving at the former coaching inn with its large beer garden in October 2018, they have introduced Scooter meets, Race Nights and a Tug of War contest for charities and held live music, disco and karaoke nights.

See the Kings Head profile on page 7 for more details and photos of the sports orientated pub which has teams in local darts and pool leagues.

This year's contest restricted nominations to previously unrecognised pubs. However, plenty of worthy nominations were still received for previous winners: The Cottage Inn, Upper

Bucklebury and the Three Horseshoes, Brimpton. Located in Newbury, two of the joint winners of the 2018 award, the Cow & Cask micropub and







hospitality, the view out to the countryside through the huge windows and the quiet classic rock music playing on the jukebox made it a wonderful place to be. There were many other visitors too, including children happily playing, mostly in the garden area outside.

At midafternoon, with breaking cloud and increasing sunshine, we ventured through Highwood Copse to Stanford Dingley for a brief stop at the Bull Inn. Low ceilings and solid oak beams testify to the 15th century origin but the smart

> furniture, fittings and signage tell of a more modern and extensive refurbishment. Customers can choose from the smaller bar room to the left, the

larger dining area to the right or the extensive rear garden. In addition to 'Doom Bar' on cask there was 'Good Old Boy' and the 3.7% session bitter we enjoyed - 'Mister Chubbs'.

The final leg of our hike threaded lanes and footpaths through Beenham and the grounds of Douai Abbey and soon we reached Woolhampton for the canalside pub / restaurant, The Rowbarge, at around 7pm, whilst clouds gathered to dispense

us with its indelible centuries-old rustic couple of hours were with two successive four-pint pitchers of

Berkshire brewed dark mild with upfront hints of raisin and a moderate bitter finish. The four other cask ales served were West Berkshire's 4% 'Old Tyler' and one each from Arkell's, Loose Cannon and Rebellion. In addition, there were two still ciders available from Berkshire's Tutts Clump and four from Lilley's. Further, we devoured up to a dozen home-made bread rolls with choice fillings while locals and visitors continued to arrive and boost the hubbub. Although it seemed impossible to top such an experience, nonetheless we continued our hike from Aldworth towards the tranquillity of Ashampstead Green and its historic St Clement's church.

Just beyond, in Yattendon, we called at West Berkshire Brewery's Taproom and fortunately the brewery's full core range of cask ale was available:

'Good Old Boy', 'Maharaja IPA', 'Mister Chubbs', 'Mister Swift' and 'Maggs Mild'. The abundant, lofty premises may be industrial-like, but our round of well kept 3.4% 'Maggs Mild' along with the staff's





The Kings Head Thatcham

The Kings Head claims to be the oldest pub in Thatcham and is located on the Broadway in the middle of town. It has recently had a complete refurbishment but still retains its air of easy welcome.

Being the friendly centre of the community is something that landlady Lisa and her husband Louis, and children Connor and Ollie, strive for and achieve. Lisa, who took over the pub in October 2018, knows the pub of old as her parents spent many hours there when she was a child, so she knows all about the history of the Kings Head and the people who use it as their local, and being a local is exactly what this pub is all about

The Kings Head is open everyday and is regularly used through the week by local tradesmen after work, and by players in the darts and pool teams. On Friday evenings there is often live music. The weekends see more families using the pub especially in good weather when the large beer garden with its outside bar comes into its own. There is also a covered area in the garden with a large screen so you don't have to choose between sitting in the garden or watching your favourite sport.

Many fund raising events for Parkinson's and Cancer charities are held. These include Scooter Meets on the first Sunday in the month, a Garden Party, Tug of War and Darts contests and Wednesday Quiz nights. The pub's regulars have also got together to make a Naked Calendar that is to be sold for charity.

Last October, Thatcham Town Council recognised the Kings Head as being the place

where, on 3rd August 1784, the first mail coach changed horses on the journey between Bristol and London. There is a blue plaque outside to commemorate this



date. More recently the pub was recognised by Ei Group (Enterprise Inns) as a 2019 regional winner for Best Sports Venue.

The Kings Head has a Lounge and Public bar either side of the central serving area, there is also a cozy alcove towards the back and a



separate pool table room to the rear. There are plenty of seats with a mix of upholstered benches and wooden chairs. Two dart boards are featured, one in the Public bar and the other with the pool

table, which means that two matches can be played at the same time. Sports fans can find TV screens to watch the live action.

Two real ales are offered, Purity Mad Goose and West Berkshire Good Old Boy. Both beers have good turnover so nothing goes to waste. Lisa also offers cider and a selection of lagers, craft and keg beers. The Guinness Extra Cold, a beer close to her heart, has been awarded a Quality Approved certificate for 2018-19. Although no meals are available, there are bar snacks including pickled eggs.

Winchester to Canterbury - The Snapper & The Scribbler's Tale



David Hatfull (the Snapper) and Ronan Hatfull (the Scribbler) set off from Newbury station on Monday 29 July with backpacks, camera equipment and sturdy walking sticks. After a day in Winchester they would hike the 138 miles of the Pilgrims'

Way to Canterbury, in twelve stages, lodging in several traditional inns on the way.

Their intention was to make photographic and written portraits of contemporary examples of the 29 pilgrims portrayed in 14th century English poet Geoffrey Chaucer's The Canterbury Tales. These excerpts from Ronan's daily blog posts mention some inns worth visiting.

Day 1 - Winchester: 'Walking into the Hyde Tavern was like stepping back in time. This traditional pub, which hosts regular open mics, writing sessions and folk nights, has been a local establishment since 1860, with original walls that date back to the 16th century.'



'The landlady, Jan, greeted us and immediately began to tell us of the Tavern's history. She has run the pub for the last 11 years and gave us a tour of the downstairs music venue and nearby remains of Hyde Abbey, a building which once rivalled the Cathedral.'

Day 6 - Albury to Box Hill: 'The Drummond Arms in the centre of Albury is a quintessential

English country inn and it is easy to imagine Chaucer's Pilgrims quaffing and quarrelling within its confines. A relaxing garden with a running brook beside it is complemented indoors by a beautiful dining room, in which we enjoyed tapas and salmon the previous evening. The inn is run by South African couple Taz and Jay'.



'Chef Jay agrees to be photographed as our representative of Chaucer's Cook. He discusses the Egyptian influence behind much of his menu due to some of the chefs he has employed. Although he is considerably more polite than the Cook (whose lewd tale is cut short by the shocked Prioress and the irate Host) he confesses that his tongue can become somewhat sharper in the kitchen! Our next stop is the bustling village of Shere.'

Day 9 - Limpsfield to Wrotham: 'Today we passed the

county boundary from Surrey into Kent. David, having been born in Kent and spent the first 12 years of his life there until his family moved to Stafford always feels a

Day 11 - Aylesford to Lenham: 'There is a stop for some liquid refreshment at the Dirty Habit, Hollingbourne, a thirteenth century inn frequented by pilgrims. This provides much needed relief before the road ahead which is dry and dusty.'

Day 12 - Lenham to Chilham: 'Dr Ryan Perry

stops by for dinner and drinks. He lives in Chilham and works at The University of Kent's School of English. Ryan has agreed to be our Clerk and paints a vivid picture of Geoffrey Chaucer as a working writer'.



'Eating and drinking in The Woolpack Inn, which houses some portraits of Chaucer's Pilgrims, the writer has never felt closer.'



Day 13 - Chilham to Canterbury: 'We awake in full awareness that this is our final day of walking. It is a strange, melancholy feeling and we discuss the way time seems to have passed differently to normal during the past fortnight. By walking from inn to inn, time seems to have elapsed more slowly and peacefully."

'We walk the final mile side by side, nearly two weeks since we departed Winchester. The sense of achievement really hits us now and it feels not unlike the day we entered central London three years ago for our 146 mile Shakespeare walk from Stratford-upon-Avon.'

'Tomorrow we will attend Sunday Service as the final mark of our pilgrimage. The evening is a relaxed affair spent at one of Canterbury's oldest pubs - The Parrot, which is mentioned in The Canterbury Tales.'

Tucked away down a cobbled street, the historic pub features medieval beams and oak floorboards. There are up to six real ales at the bar.

We are so thankful for all the kind people we have encountered along the pilgrimage and to all those who agreed to be photographed as part of this project. We will never forget this.'

Cask ale in Brussels

A Brussels Beer City (www.beercity.brussels) blog post by Eoghan Walsh titled Gulp // Cask ale comes to Brussels mentions Jenlain Delcourt and his partner Jody Lecieux opening Gist in December 2017.

Gist (Flemish for yeast) is located at Place de la Vieille Halle aux Blés 30, Brussels, facing a cobbled open space which has a bronze statue of Jacques Brel.

In late June, after a few days in Antwerp for the Beer Passion Weekend beer festival, Ullage editor Tim Thomas and friends spent three hours on a warm Sunday afternoon outside Gist sampling draught beers from the sixteen taps and the two hand pumps with swan necks.



On our visit the cask ales were Taras Boulba from Brasserie de la Senne and Heavy Porter from No Science Brasserie, both Brussels based.

Before leaving, Tim spoke with Jenlain who explained that they are able to sell casks of beer within three days so that the quality is maintained. They also check the cask beer carefully each day and will not serve it if the quality has deteriorated. The couple expect to be involved with serving cask beer at the BXL BeerFest in late August.

Later on Sunday, after Gist had closed, Tim would meet Jenlain and Jody as customers in Moeder Lambic Fontainas. Jenlain had previously worked at this leading Brussels beer bar, established in 2006. There are six hand pumps half way along the rear wall of the long bar which also has 40 taps evenly spaced along the front. Originally, these hand pumps were mainly used to serve lambic and kriek but Jenlain introduced some pale ales to this range.

WhatPub is the Go-to website on mobile or desktop to find pubs, whether you are a CAMRA member or not.

WhatPub (whatpub.com) is also the portal allowing members to submit beer scores for the pubs they visit using the National Beer Scoring System (NBSS) as below.

- 0. No cask ale available
- **1. Poor.** Beer that is anything from barely drinkable to drinkable with considerable resentment.
- 2. Average. Competently kept, drinkable pint but doesn't inspire in any way, not worth moving to another pub but you drink the beer without really noticing.
- 3. Good. Good beer in good form. You may cancel plans to move to the next pub. You want to stay for another pint and may seek out the beer again.
- 4. Very Good. Excellent beer in excellent condition.
- **5. Perfect.** Probably the best you are ever likely to find. A seasoned drinker will award this score very rarely.

Members new to beer scoring will be able to find great tutoring support at our Branch meetings and social events and online: www.camra.org.uk/nbss

At meetings in January and February, the West Berkshire branch of CAMRA relies on collated beer scores to determine which pubs are selected for the Good Beer Guide.

Submitting beer scores throughout the year is an excellent way of contributing to the Campaign while doing something enjoyable. If there's no phone signal, just submit when next connected, using desktop or mobile versions of WhatPub.

Geographer and environmentalist **Bob Steel** signed copies of his pub walks books at the Great British Beer Festival on Tuesday 6 August. Apart from a lifelong interest in good beer and good architecture, he is a keen walker, cyclist and organic gardener.

Describing the fully revised third edition of CAMRA's Peak District pub walks, Bob said 'The economic history of the Peak has left us a very rich industrial and transport heritage which is apparent in the majority of the walks in this volume. Add to this the variety of plants in the different environments and the handsome individuality of the vernacular buildings and you have a series of fascinating layers which helps to explain why this is my favourite area of Britain for walking. Also the Peaks pubs are thriving, although there have been some losses, and the beer choice and quality has probably never been better. This book is a celebration of both the fine pubs of the Peak District and the enticing landscape.'

Bob's four other pub walks books cover London, Edinburgh, Yorkshire and the South East. Each illustrated book contains detailed walks, featuring pubs along the route that serve real ale, together with a commentary about the local area and history.



Stand-up comedian **James Dowdeswell** also signed copies of his CAMRA book, *The Pub Manifesto* (featured in Ullage Winter 2018/19), at the festival. Earlier, James had entertained the audience, waiting for the official announcement of 2019 Champion Beer of Britain winners, with tales of his experiences growing up in a pub owned by his parents.




CAMRA's best selling Good Beer Guide 2020 is published on 12 September, 2019.

Some thoughts on Bristol pubs

In general, Bristol pubs are good.

They tend to be friendly, even if they don't always look it.

They're extremely varied – hippy hangouts, old boys boozers, gastropubs, craft beer exhibitions, backstreet gems, family hangouts, and so on.

They mostly have real ale, even those that might not if they were in any other city. We reckon we've counted three (four if you think BrewDog is a pub) that didn't have anything at all on offer.

They're loyal to local beer, even if there's no single dominant historic city brewery.

Your chances of finding Bass, Courage Best, Butcombe or some other classic bitter are very high. The likelihood of finding mild is almost zero. Hoppy beers tend to be hazy, soft and sweet. (Not that we're grumbling but we do sometimes crave paler, drier beers of the northern variety.)

Sparklers, in summary

(May 16, 2019)

[A sparkler is a perforated nozzle attached to the end of a handpull. Regularly used in the North of England but less often in the South.]

- Sparklers work best with well-conditioned beer, bringing some of CO2 out of suspension to form a denser head, but leaving plenty in the body of the pint.
- But if a beer is low on condition, a sparkler might well rob it of what little CO2 it has, leaving it with a head, but even flatter beneath.
- Therefore, sparklers might equally be used to make beer in poor condition look better than it is, or to give a beer in good condition a particular presentation.
- But there's no way for a drinker to know until they taste it.
- Sparklers may also mute or otherwise affect perception of certain flavours and aromas.
 Some beers are brewed with this in mind.
- Otherwise, it's a matter of personal preference.
- So sparklers are neither purely good, nor purely evil.

When is a Pub not a Pub?

When it's a bar, of course. While there's no specific legal distinction, the two carry very different connotations. This is not to say one is better than the other, but they're certainly not interchangeable. However, it's notoriously difficult to come up with a hard-and-fast definition separating one from the other.

Beer writer Martyn Cornell has recently had another stab at it on his Zythophile blog, where he suggests that a key distinction is that pubs tend to have a bar at right angles to your path when coming in through the entrance door, whereas bars have their counter running along a side wall.


In general, while you can point to various characteristics that pubs usually have, and bars don't, it's always possible to come up with exceptions to the rule. Overall, it's often a case of 'you know one when you see one'.


Pub names usually start with 'The', but bar names seldom do. Pubs are often specific buildings designed for the purpose, while bars tend to be part of a larger building. Pubs make use of the upper floors of the building, while a bar may be underneath something entirely different. The licensees of a pub are likely to live on the premises, but with a bar they hardly ever do. Bars are often aimed at a specific, identifiable 'crowd', while pubs seek a wider and more general clientele. And, at least outside urban centres, pubs often have car parks, but I can't think of a single bar that does. A pub retains its identity through various changes of ownership, while that of a bar is very much tied up with its current trading format.

Some Wetherspoons, particularly those in their more modern design idiom that are conversions of former retail units, do very much say 'bar' rather than 'pub', whereas others that are in existing pub premises are definitely pubs. However, their general atmosphere and wide customer mix are very much those of pubs regardless of their design. And, while their name says otherwise, I'd say that the vast majority of micropubs, going by the criteria set out above, are in reality small

There's also the vexed question of when a pub actually turns into a restaurant. Most restaurants obviously aren't pubs, but quite a few have the outward appearance of pubs and indeed might once have been one. Strictly speaking, if anyone can come in and have a drink without needing to buy a meal, it doesn't qualify as just being a restaurant. However, I'd say there also needs to be a test of whether any meaningful number of people actually do, and whether non-diners are made to feel welcome.
