Describing the award as the icing on the cake after getting the Lion into CAMRA's Good Beer Guide, Kevin said that it had been a team effort involving Sanna and Joe as well.

Presenting the award to Kevin and Sam, Mike Avery, Branch Secretary, said that since they took over the Lion in October 2019 it has become a real ale destination pub renowned for its range and quality of ales.

Kevin has a history of good cellarmanship with previous managerial roles at the King Charles Tavern and the Catherine Wheel in

Newbury leading to Good Beer Guide entries. Since taking over at the West Street corner pub, he has been able to train Sanna, Kieran and Joe in the cellarmanship and bar skills needed to ensure that beer is served at its best.

The community pub sponsored Newbury Lions FC home kit and is visited by players after Sunday league football matches.

Wadworth beers, including 6X and Horizon, are served alongside guest ales sourced nationally and changing frequently. Tex-Mex food is also available. Sports events are shown on several screens.

### **Swift Halves**



Thatcham based Delphic Brewing Company brewed 'It's Just the One Hop, Actually' with Sabro in 2021. For the second iteration of the single hop pale ale series, Tom Broadbank has chosen the Citra hop with a 'flavour profile of grapefruit, lime and tropical fruits'.

Two new limited edition cask beers will be released in June. 'Can't Kick Up the Roots' a 4.8% ABV West Coast IPA brewed with Citra, Cascade, Columbus and Centennial hops! As yet unnamed, the second beer is a ruby red ESB brewed in collaboration with Reading's Phantom Brewing Co.

Tom has continued doing his local delivery round every Friday. Order through www.delphicbrewing.com for free delivery within 10 miles of the brewery or £3 if further.

A discount code, UllageMag0622, created for Ullage readers and applied before checkout will give 5% off all cans for the month of June.

Delphic Brewing's Level Crossing best bitter is often available from cask at CAMRA's National Pub of the Year, the Bell Inn, Aldworth. Badged as Wheatsheaf, it is also available at the Wheatsheaf Inn, Thatcham.

that brewing vessels have been ordered. The brewery name has not yet been announced but it is hoped that from September, the Bell will be an outlet for its traditional cask ales.

- Ye Olde Red Lion, Chieveley, has been an Arkell's pub since 1992. Robin Macdonald retired, after 17 years in charge, at the end of March. Dougal and Jo are the new hosts.
- The Blue Ball, Kintbury, reopened on 24 March with Lisa as the new manager. The grey bar stools and bar front have been repainted blue. The large garden has well spaced seating and the pub is dog friendly.



• The Catherine Wheel has increased the number of chilled boxed ciders available, as shown on the blackboard in the front page photo. Six cask ales are served by handpumps on the bar. Warwick plans to feature more live music and host an early September beer festival at the pub.

The nearby Spare Wheel has reopened after a refit. The focus here is on KeyKegs and KeyCasks from Double-Barrelled, Elusive Brewing, Phantom Brewing, Siren Craft Brew and Wild Weather, as well as breweries from further afield. Tap takeovers and live acoustic music will also feature here. The weekly quiz is held on Tuesdays at 8pm with a £50 bar tab prize.

■ The second 2022 Wild Weather Open Day was held on Saturday 7 May at the brewery unit on Easter Park industrial estate, near Silchester. Visitors were refreshed by a free half pint of beer on arrival. Perched on a ladder, Head Brewer Jamie 'JD' Duffield gave brewery 'tours' to assembled groups at two hourly intervals. At the pallet bar, Matt served Sleepy Joe's from cask and eight beers from KeyKeg ranging from Lux, a flagship 3.6% ABV session pale to Cephalopod 2021, a 12% ABV Imperial honey stout.

After the event, the brewery posted on social media 'It was a fantastic day ... We cannot wait to bring you another cracker of an open day very soon!'. Check @WildWeatherAles on Twitter and @wild.weather.brewery on Facebook for details of future events.



JD's blog post on www.wildweatherales.com mentions that Sleepy Joe's 4.2% ABV traditional best bitter was originally brewed in 2021 to celebrate the pubs and bars tentatively opening their gardens after the long period of covid-related closure. JD writes 'A year on, Sleepy Joe's has


proved popular beyond our expectations and now features as part of our flagship cask offering alongside Calleva (4% ABV West Coast Blonde). The best pint can be found at our own taproom, the Weather Station ...' (Reading).

Sleepy Joe's has recently been released in 440ml cans. 'It is live, unfiltered and naturally carbonated from within the can by the action of the yeast - as close to cask conditioning as can be achieved outside of a cask itself ... with no filtration.'

- Despite public support, the planning application (21/02825/FUL) for partial redevelopment of the Bell at Boxford was refused. The decision notice mentions concerns over surface water management and likely effects on the River Lambourn Special Area of Conservation.
- The **Butt Inn**, Aldermaston Wharf, is temporarily closed while Punch Pubs & Co arranges refurbishment and new management.
- The **Old London Apprentice** is holding an outdoor festival on Friday 3 and Saturday 4 June with a variety of cask ales from Indigenous Brewery and several draught ciders. There is plenty of outdoor seating in the rear garden, the side 'paddock' and the front decked area. See advertisement below for more details about the pub, near Newbury Racecourse.

• The Yattendon Brewing Company Ltd (YBC), a wholly owned subsidiary of Yattendon Group plc, acquired West Berkshire Brewery (WBB) on 23rd December 2021. In April, YBC appointed Ian Rogers as the new Managing Director of WBB.



A press release was issued with details of his career. Having worked for Bass and Allied in the eighties, Ian Rogers founded Wychwood Brewery in 1990 at the age of 27. From small beginnings of one brewer and one drayman, Ian with the help of 3i developed the company into a £30 million turnover business with 36 pubs and created the famous Hobgoblin beer brand. Between 2006 and 2020 Ian was MD of Randall's of Guernsey, transforming ... the brewery, distillery, pub and hotel company.

Ian Rogers, said 'I am keen to turn WBB into a cutting-edge craft brewer with unique beer brands, incredible tasting craft ales and English lagers in addition to our award-winning Good Old Boy Best Bitter. When I started my first brewery Wychwood 32 years ago I was at the vanguard of the Craft Beer industry, I basically want to see if I have still

Ian Rogers has recently revealed that WBB's new name will be The Renegade Brewing Company.





Land of Hop and Glory is the brewery's summer seasonal ale. The hoppy English Pale Ale has been brewed with Ernest hops from Kent and heritage Plumage Archer malt giving rounded flavours of apricot and nectarine.

There have been a few recipe changes to Mister Chubb's, WBB's 3.4% ABV session bitter. The malt ratio has been altered to increase the body and caramel notes. The hops have been changed for some Phoenix and Sovereign creating 'a much improved version'.

The next WBB Quiz at the brewery's Taproom & Kitchen in Yattendon is on 29 June.




Following the planting, Chairman, James Arkell made a toast, unveiling the brewery's new beer. Jubilee Ale, brewed by James' son Alex





### Berkshire pubs ticked



Si BRAPA Everitt is on an adventure to visit every current pub in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide during his lifetime and drink one pint minimum at each.

On Tuesday 5 April, he arrived in Newbury on the eighth birthday of his British Real Ale Pub Adventure with mascot Colin the cauliflower.

Ullage editor, Tim Thomas, met Si at the station and drove him to the West Berkshire Brewery Taproom and Kitchen in Yattendon and then to the Great Shefford before returning to Newbury.

Tim was then able to enjoy pints with Si at the Lock Stock & Barrel and the Lion before Si caught a bus to Thatcham to visit the Wheatsheaf.

### The Bunk Inn Curridge

The Bunk Inn is tucked away in the village of Curridge, just off the B4009, between Long Lane and Hermitage, about 5 miles north of Newbury and Thatcham.

Over one hundred years old - on the 1883 Ordnance Survey, it's shown as the New Inn, suggesting that it became a pub in the mid 19th century. According to local historian, Roy Barlow, it got its present name when workers from the saw mill and sand pit, which were roughly where the Curridge Road joins the B4009, 'bunked off' to have a drink. That seems to be an unlikely story as it is still shown as the New Inn on the 1960 map. Now owned by Upham Inns, The Bunk Inn has been extensively refurbished and tastefully redecorated, making it very welcoming.

The cosy bar area is relatively narrow at the front but extends round the corner to the left. At the right end is a large, open, airy dining room. In the winter, there is a large log-burning fire where visitors can warm up. The ample

seating ranges from comfortable chairs and benches to stools at the bar. Outside, at the front, there are large tables and seats under parasols. A large garden at the rear overlooks open fields where horses run free.

The bar can serve up to four cask ales and they rotate through a short list. When we visited, these were Bombardier, London Pride and Tribute. The 'Pride' was in excellent condition. Other ales are offered at seasonal occasions. There is also a range of keg beers including lagers, bottled beers and draught cider.

We had an evening meal there and were impressed by the friendly, welcoming staff, the menu choices and the speed of service. The menu includes: soup of the day; seared scallops; beer battered haddock; grilled aubergine, field mushroom and chimichurri burger; rib-eye steak and seven desserts. There is a good selection of gluten-free, vegetarian and vegan choices on the menu. The Sunday lunch menu has a selection of roast meats.



The pub is dog-friendly and caters for all tastes. It has nine en suite bedrooms. There is limited parking at the front but a very large car park behind the pub. Level access is by a side door rather than the front, where there is a step. With easy access to the A34 and M4, it is an ideal centre for visiting local attractions and for walkers who wish to enjoy the beautiful countryside.

The Bunk Inn is open every day of the week from 12 midday. It closes at 11pm Monday - Saturday; 10pm on Sunday.

Meals are served 12 - 2.30pm and 5 - 9pm Monday to Thursday; 12 - 9.30pm Fridays and Saturdays; 12 - 8pm Sundays. The pub is also open for breakfast 8 - 11am on Sundays.

### CAMRA's Beer Styles

Beer comes in many colours and has a variety of aromas and flavours. The beer style categories used for judging CAMRA Champion Beer of Britain were revised in 2019.

There are now 12 categories to incorporate a wide variety of styles:


- 1. Milds: up to 4% ABV
- 2. Session Bitters: up to 4.3% ABV
- 3. Premium Bitters: 4.4% 6.4% ABV
- 4. Session Pale, Blond and Golden Ales: up to 4.3% ABV
- 5. Premium Pale, Blond and Golden Ales: 4.4% 6.4% ABV
- 6. British and New World IPAs: 5.5% ABV and above
- 7. Brown and Red Ales, Old Ales and Strong Milds: up to 6.4% ABV
- 8. Session Stouts and Porters: up to 4.9% ABV
- 9. Strong Stouts and Porters: 5% ABV and above
- 10. Barley Wines and Strong Ales: 6.5% and above
- 11. Speciality Beers Differently produced e.g. Lager
- 12. Speciality Beers Flavoured

On 29 April, West Berkshire CAMRA held a tutored tasting event at the Lion, Newbury, hosted by Richard Marshall (Hermitage Brewery).

Six half pints of cask ale were savoured with results marked on tasting cards that include a grid for aroma, taste and aftertaste against malt, roast, caramel, hops, citrus, fruit, sulphur, yeast and sweetness.

Tony Girling said 'My favourite was Tunnel Vision (amber bitter) by Box Steam Brewery, it had a bitter / sweet taste, not too strong.' The other beers sampled were Tiny Rebel Press Start (Black IPA), Wadworth 6X (bitter), Burnt Orange IPA, Horizon (crisp golden ale) and Dirty Rucker (rich ruby).



### Quinno visits 15 Belfast pubs



Quinten Taylor celebrated his January birthday with a trip to Northern Ireland when '... prices are cheap, the attractions are quiet and there's no queue at the bar'.

'Getting from Belfast City airport to our accommodation was easy. We stayed in the swanky Europa Hotel, right in the centre, opposite the Crown Liquor Saloon (photo above) and offering competitive rates to fill rooms. An interesting fact is that there's an open bottle of Bushmill's Whiskey available at breakfast for you to pour on your porridge.'

'Belfast is awash with pretty pubs, though its relationship with beer is very one-dimensional, as Diageo has a similar stranglehold on bars here to the Republic. There is a small local craft scene though there aren't many outlets for their

produce. Cask is a rarity, quality is a bit hit-and-miss and sometimes you'll go to a Good Beer Guide listed pub and find no cask at all!'


### **Crown Liquor Saloon**

46 Great Victoria Street, BT2 7BA Cask = Yes

Described elsewhere as the jewel of Northern Ireland's pubs and it's very hard to disagree; astounding both inside and out and is up there with the best interiors in Britain; it may well be the most ornate. 'High Victoriana' style, amazingly intricate tiled exterior which matches

the feel inside - doored booths, ceramic bar frontage, stained glass windows, illustrated mirrored panels, carved wood features and animals, patterned floor tiling and probably a load of other stuff I didn't note - every time you look round you notice something new. Leased by Nicholson's via the National Trust, three cask ales on when I visited from Black Sheep, Titanic and Timothy Taylor. Beware that it's a fairly small pub so time your visit for the quietest hours, especially if you want a booth. Should be number one on your Belfast visit list as you won't want to miss it.

### Elusive Brewing visit Newbury

A Meet the Brewer / tasting event was held at the Cow & Cask, Newbury on 23 February 2016 when Andy Parker had only just got the keys to the vacant unit for Elusive Brewing on the Hogwood Industrial Estate, Finchampstead, Berkshire.

Andy brought three 5 litre mini-casks of prototype beers: *Cherrywood Road* (smoked ruby mild); a *pale ale* dosed with natural apricot fruit flavouring and *Level Up* (American red ale hopped with Mosaic and Equinox).

A post about the event featured in the BeerEurope blog and a photo was published in the Summer 2016 issue of Ullage.



On Friday 11 March 2022, Andy returned to Newbury for a beer tasting event organised by Inn at Home. He was accompanied by Ruth Mitchell, Elusive Brewing's Operations Director (an accredited Beer Sommelier and Certified Cicerone). This was the first event that they had presented for a couple of years. In his introduction, Inn at Home's David Marklew described Elusive as 'one of our favourite local brewers', adding 'we love their beers'.

Andy said he was 'a home brewer with a hobby that got out of control'. Ricky Moysey, previously with Binghams, is now the brewer at Elusive. Cask is currently around 30% - 40% of output. Andy explained that the 8 bit pixel artwork used on cans was based on his use of a BBC Micro back in the 1980s and that some Elusive beers are named after computer games.

Five beers were tasted, poured from cans:

- Blue Ridge Parkway American Pale Ale hopped with Citra and Ekuanot (from a series named after scenic drives).
- Microball 'a modern take on a dark mild' hopped with Bramling Cross. It's hoped that

this reddish mild will become a regular in their lineup. While David offered Cheese & Onion Pringles around as an accompaniment, Ruth suggested that a strong cheddar cheese would make a good match.

Level Up - American
Red Ale - 'our flagship
beer although not our
best seller'. The original



2014 home brewed version of this beer, hopped with Simcoe and Citra, won Andy a £5,000 prize from the Craft Beer Co. This was used as a deposit for the Elite stainless steel brew kit supplied from Swindon in 2016. The Level 27 version at this event was hopped with Citra and Galaxy.

- b Double Oregon Trail 'a bigger, badder, bolder' 8% ABV imperial version of best seller Oregon Trail and canned just four days earlier. The same hops were used: initially Chinook and Citra then dry hopped with Columbus, Simcoe and Mosaic.
- Bee Strong 'Wee Heavy' with added honey from Tilehurst and aged for months in oak Bourbon barrels. The two barrels are now used as tables at Reading's Grumpy Goat cheese, beer and cider shop in Union Street (traded by Andy for cheese!).

# Mountain or molehill?

I recently spotted a tap for keg
Wainwright on the bar of a pub. What
perhaps surprised me is that it wasn't
in some marginal low-turnover boozer
but in a prominent Good Beer Guide
listed pub with several well-kept cask
ales on the bar. So the question
occurred as to whether this is
something that lovers of cask ale
should be worried about.

A significant and often under-appreciated achievement of CAMRA is that it has created a large constituency of drinkers who are loyal to cask as a category over and above individual brands. Back in the early 70s, people would probably identify first as 'bitter drinkers' and then express a preference for Tetley's, Boddingtons, Courage or whatever. But that has reversed now, and in general they will go for cask first ahead of any loyalty to a specific brand. When I mentioned this on Twitter, the general response was that people would give it a swerve purely on the grounds that it was a keg beer.

It's not even as though they get the opportunity to switch between the different formats now anyway. Again, fifty years ago it was easy to find the same beer available in cask and keg or top pressure form, and it could be difficult to distinguish the two from the bar mountings. But now, overwhelmingly, the two are separate brands – even Tetley's Cask is clearly distinguished from Tetley's Smooth.

However, while a lot of drinkers do have a strong loyalty to cask as a category, many others who drink it occasionally will be 'repertoire drinkers' who switch between lager, Guinness, keg ales and cask depending on mood and occasion. The growth of 'craft keg' has in a sense rehabilitated the keg category. If people are routinely seeing the likes of Punk IPA and Camden Pale on the bar, then what's to stop them trying keg Wainwright as well? Or indeed keg London Pride or Landlord?

So, while I don't see the existence of keg versions of Wainwright and other top-selling ales is in itself a threat to cask in well-established outlets, there must be a possibility that it could damage cask by blurring its distinctiveness in more marginal venues.

It should, of course, go without saying, that the best way to promote cask ale is to ensure that it is served fresh, cool and full of condition. Cask's worst enemy is not keg, it's poor cask.

## Fifteen years of blogging about beer and pubs

On the 25th April 2007, the first post appeared on our blog. It wasn't anything very exciting in itself - we just wanted to test how it all worked before committing - but was the start of something that has brought us a lot of fun and satisfaction over the years.

When work or real life has been tough, the blog has been somewhere to retreat. You can't be depressed when you're totally absorbed in writing something about gin palaces, or organising a tasting of bottled milds.

More than that, though, it's taught us new skills, most notably how to write – and how to collaborate on writing.

#### **Questions answered**

To mark this little milestone, we put it to readers, followers and subscribers in various places that we'd be up for answering any questions they might have.

Given the amount of hype around some beers and breweries, is there one subject of adulation that you have found warranted the attention? - Stuart Pritchard, via Patreon

We struggle with this a bit. Few breweries that appear from nowhere and generate lots of excitement in a short period of time have ever really worked for us. We sometimes feel out of step, wondering if we're missing something. But, ultimately, we have to trust our own judgement. Sometimes those breweries get good, if they stick it out. Siren, for example, we recall finding underwhelming early on but now, well established and consistent, they've become a go-to for us. Generally, we prefer breweries that start small and quiet and build a buzz over the course of years. We'd never have called Elusive a hype brewery and yet we hear that the other week a 'meet the brewer' event generated queues around the block. They've earned that following.

If you could resurrect one beer that has ceased being brewed, or the original brewery has ceased to exist, what would it be? – Ian Garrett, via Twitter

First, there are beers we miss from the last decade or two, such as Fuller's Chiswick Bitter. This was a go-to, especially for Jess, and we still don't understand the logic behind its disappearance. ("Poor sales!" Yes, but also poor marketing.)

### Have your thoughts on what makes an ideal pub changed since you first started? – Lisa Grimm, via Twitter

Yes. When we started blogging, we were constantly irritated at pubs only having brown bitter on offer and would rate pubs more highly because of their beer offer even if the atmosphere wasn't great. We were on a mission back then to try as many beers as possible and expand our knowledge. Now, we value variety much more. The ideal pub now will have personality, individual character and something unique about its offer - whether that's cheese rolls in paper bags, a particularly good jukebox or, say, weirdly flat Bass. One of our latest thoughts, that we haven't quite worked through yet, is that a great pub should make the regulars feel as if they're at home without making incomers feel unwelcome.
